


WANTED

HISTORY OF ENGLAND GROUP

LONDON BRIDGE

Did you know that our very own London Bridge now stands in a remote Arizona desert city?

For 2000 years there have been wooden bridges over the river Thames and the Roman founders of London built various wooden bridges from AD 50 – 1176.

A military campaign by the King of Norway was a sea-based attack and in 1014 pulled down one of the wooden bridges.

This was replaced by another wooden bridge and despite requiring frequent repairs, survived for more than 600 years.

The London bridge of nursery rhyme fame was a stone bridge which had houses on it; it was built between 1176 and 1209 by Peter of Colechurch who was an architect and priest. This had a grisly period as, at the southern gateway, between 1305 and 1660 it was the custom to display the heads of wrongdoers on pikes. William Wallace who led the wars for Scottish Independence was the first head to appear. Other heads included Sir Thomas Moore and Bishop John Fisher in 1535 and Thomas Cromwell in 1540.A visitor to London in 1598 counted over 30 heads displayed. The old London Bridge fell into sever disrepair and was blocking river traffic so in 1799 a new bridge was designed by John Rennie and was dedicated on August 1,1831.

This bridge, due to the weight of horse drawn carriages and automobiles in the early 20th century began sinking into the Thames at the rate of an inch every eight years and by 1924 the east side was three to four inches lower than the west side.

McCulloch and Vanderbilt placed a winning bid of \$2.4 million on April 18th, 1968, to buy it and take it to America where they set up Lake Havasu City Resort where they rededicated the bridge in October 1971.
