EASTWOOD & DISTRICT u3a HISTORY

Steering Committee, Inaugural Meeting and first Interest Groups

After the launch, the people who had volunteered to help form the steering committee met up, agreed their roles and began working out what their 'job' entailed. With the help of mentors - Michaela Moody, Karen Highfield Taylor and Jan Pavier - they set about creating the constitution, rules for membership, opening bank accounts, creating the newsletter and website, plus many spreadsheets for membership details and finance.

It was agreed that this new u3a would be called the Eastwood & District u3a, to encompass Kimberley and local villages in the NG16 area. An outline plan was made for the Monthly Meetings - a guest speaker, the opportunity to join interest groups, news updates and refreshments; new members to be able to join at each meeting.

The Inaugural Meeting was held on Wednesday 2nd July in Plumtre Hall, St Mary's Church, Eastwood where almost 100 people signed up as members of the new Eastwood and District u3a. The Steering Committee had worked hard to get things started and were overwhelmed at the fantastic response to the inaugural meeting. Many of the first 100 members are still taking a very active part in our u3a.

Michaela Moody, the East Midlands Regional Trustee, started off the meeting by introducing the new chairman, Ann McGillivray, who in turn introduced the other members of the steering committee. This committee would run the Eastwood & District u3a for the first year until the AGM.

Special Interest Groups are the heart of the u3a and the following groups were set up at the Inaugural Meeting: Spanish, Singing for fun, Apple Computing, Craft/Textiles, Bridge, Strollers, Walks- 5 miles, Vegetable Gardening and Book Group. Some of these groups still exist, with the same Group Contact.

HISTORY OF ENGLAND

You may be surprised to know that if you were a Victorian lady your best hat would be adorned with several stuffed birds, feathers and all!



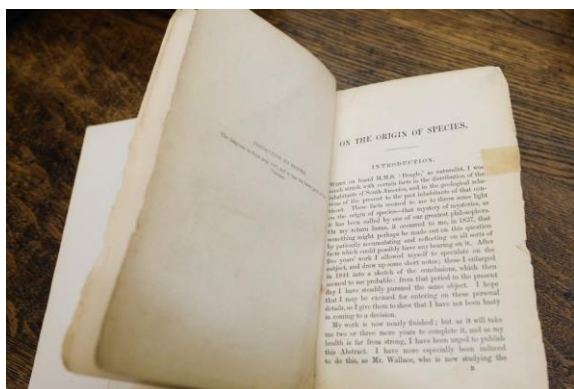
The History of England group have been learning about Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and the developments in the Victorian era for several months now; both the factual and the quirky.

Victoria reigned from 1837 to 1901 and her love for Prince Albert is well known. They had nine children and resided on the Isle of Wight in Osborne House.



Prince Albert died in 1861 from typhoid but modern research has shown that he may have been suffering from Crohn's disease.

Major events during the period include the introduction of the penny post; the Victoria Cross is founded for Military bravery; Charles Darwin wrote *On the Origin of Species*; the Education Act made primary education compulsory, and Victoria became Empress of India.



The Great Exhibition in Crystal Palace was the first international exhibition, conceived by Prince Albert in 1851 to celebrate the Industrial Revolution. There were more than 100,000 products on display and more than six million people visited it.



We now go on to look at the British Empire next month. By the end of the 19th century Victoria ruled over "*the greatest empire the world has ever seen*".

But back to some of the quirky fashions of the time. Ladies used arsenic to ensure a clear and fresh complexion; families posed for photographs with their newly departed; Victorians who had travelled to Egypt brought back mummies to unwrap at special unwrapping parties, and there were many clubs dedicated to eating the weirdest animals. Even Charles Darwin was a keen eater of anything exotic.

Let's hope these don't catch on again!
