ART APPRECIATION

In November, one of our members, Janet Lander, did an interesting presentation about the British artist, Stanley Spencer (1891 - 1959). She explained how his art was influenced by both his religious beliefs, and also his love of his home town, Cookham in Berkshire.

The talk charted how he was commissioned to create murals to commemorate the life of Henry Willoughby Sandham, who died in 1919, following the wounds he sustained in Macedonia during the First World War. These can still be seen today at the Sandham Memorial Chapel in Burghclere, near Newbury (National Trust). He produced many bible-based pictures, using Cookham as the location, and used a semi-abstract style which echoed the paintings of Giotto and Breughel.

He also worked as an official War Artist during both World Wars. We also learnt about this complicated personal life and how this affected his art.
