There will be more toppers to come - in June and maybe September.



Illustrations


In February, we brought examples of our favourite illustrations. They ranged from old, treasured copies of Arabian Nights (including pictures by Heath Robinson), Grimms' Fairy Tales, Peter Pan, Thomas the Tank Engine and The Eagle Annual. Styles ranged from the sentimental – Mabel Lucie Attwell with her round-faced cherubs - to the darker images of Arthur Rackham.





We enjoyed recalling other favourite books from childhood and the wonderful illustrations which brought them life – E H Shepard who illustrated Wind in the Willows and the Winnie the Pooh stories. Others mentioned were Beatrix Potter and Alice in Wonderland (Sir John Tenniel and others). More modern favourites included Axel Sheffler, who illustrates the Julia Donaldson books and Helen Oxenbury (We're going on a Bear Hunt). An adult example from the past was the illustrations of Charles Dickens books by Phiz and then Boz.





We all agreed that the best illustrations are genuine works of art and can greatly enhance a reader's pleasure. We discussed whether the televising of many old favourites has widened their audience, but maybe at the expense of making the images more uniform.

Breach House, 28 Garden Road Eastwood was the childhood home of D H Lawrence from 1887 to 1891. It was immortalised as the 'Bottoms' in his semi autobiographical novel Sons & Lovers & the ground floor is mainly unchanged from that time.

The house will be open on the following Saturdays - 6th April, 4th May, 1st June, 6th July, 3rd August, 7th September, 5th October, 11.00a.m. to 3.00p.m.
